


# STRAIGHT

As I'm writing this I am listening to an old Carpenters album (*yes, vinyl!*) hearing "Rainy days and Mondays always get me down." I remember as a young adult hearing that Karen Carpenter, the singer, had suffered from heart complications from depression and anorexia in her early 30s. The recent news on her health had been good, that she was recovering, and then quickly she was gone. It was a huge loss for my generation, and since I loved her upbeat music I thought about her a lot in the years that followed. What could have helped her? Why had her mental illness been a secret? What a tough life, to appear before fans as this together, beautiful woman, and to be struggling so much with hidden internal torment!

Sometimes I think our state seems that way. We live in a beautiful state with gorgeous natural beauty. But inside, the illness festers. Our mental health system is in disarray. The federal government is suing the state for its poor care of people with mental illness, who have been put into rest homes where their needs aren't met. We are in the process of moving from our old systems of waivers and funding to new Managed Care Organizations, and no one seems to really know exactly how to do this. Funding cuts have once again arrived, for us to the tune of about \$2.5 million.

But Monarch's role in this chaos is to remain stable, solid, and to continue to provide exceptional services to the people we support with intellectual/developmental disabilities, mental illness, and substance abuse challenges. Our staff are the best in the state, and we understand that our mission is to help people achieve what *they* want in their lives, not what professionals think they should have. Monarch is active at the local LME (Local Management Entity) and state levels, working collaboratively to move the system forward. We are forming partnerships, ensuring we are up to date on changes, and preparing for the President's health reform, coming in 2014. Monarch continues to weather this storm as we have weathered all of those in over 50 years of service.

What does that mean for you? It means you can continue to expect outstanding supports and services. Of course, we have to be flexible as the state modifies service definitions and eligibility of services. But our commitment to you is to continue to be creative and innovative and to do more with less. We will stay strong and stable and move quickly to change as the state implements new concepts and ideas. We are here for you.

# a Dream Monarch Reveals Plans for a New Creative Arts & Community Center

It won't be long before those in Monarch's day program in Southern Pines will be living a dream. The people we support will soon be joined by local artists, Sandhills Community College faculty, students, and community members at the Monarch Creative Arts & Community Center. This new building and creative program will allow the people we support to explore and realize their creative abilities like never before.

They will have a new place to call their own in January 2012. The Monarch Creative Arts & Community Center (MCACC), formerly Vocational LINKS, is near completion. Monarch was presented with the opportunity to relocate the program to a brand-new state-of-the-art facility nearly eighteen months ago.

People we support and their families were asked what they envisioned for the program's new space. The response was unanimous—they wanted a place where they could express their creative abilities.

Monarch is excited to have this opportunity to partner with the communities of Aberdeen, Southern Pines, Pinehurst, and Sandhills Community College, as well as many local artists to make the dream of a new creative arts and community center a reality.

MCACC will provide opportunities for the people we support to grow and improve their creative abilities and share them with the community. Through visual art, painting, pottery, needlepoint, quilting, and performing arts like interpretive dance and stage performances, people who attend this program will be able to share their talents and love of the arts with the surrounding communities. A cutting-edge computer lab with the latest adaptive technology is also planned for the center.

Professional artists, local community college interns and faculty, and community volunteers will work alongside Monarch staff to teach people each day.



Amy Chavis, Program Director, feels the center will provide an incredible opportunity for the community to engage with the people we support and that it will help integrate learning and serving with people of all abilities.

Dr. Peggy Terhune, CEO of Monarch hopes that the new center will be a model that others in the state will desire as well.



Monarch will use the new center during the day and offer the opportunity for local community members to join in the offered classes alongside the people we support. In the evening and on weekends, the space will be open for distance learning classes offered by Sandhills Community College and for civic, church, and community organizations meeting and hosting activities. Local group homes will also have access to the space in the evenings. An official open house will be hosted later in 2012.

At Monarch, we meet many people with disabilities who are either unemployed or underemployed, despite their ability, desire, and willingness to engage in meaningful work in the community. People with disabilities are underrepresented in our workforce. Although typically about 80% of adults over 18 are employed, only 37% of people over 18 who have disabilities are employed.

Achieving a good and steady job is a dream for many of the people we support. Our vocational services and job training coaches provide the extra tools and training that are needed for success in the workplace. A job allows the people we support to become more independent and helps make their dreams a reality.

# A rewarding job and a successful young man

Victor was hired at Walmart this summer after working at a previous job for 12 hours a week. He is now averaging 32<sup>+</sup> hours a week at Walmart. As a result of his gainful employment and with the support of his family and assistance from his Monarch counselor Kim Auman, he submitted an application for an apartment close to where he works and is currently on the waiting list.

In September, Victor was nominated and awarded the honor of being selected the Associate of the Month in

The Monarch Beach Club is an innovative community-based "program without walls" located in North Carolina's Outer Banks that supports people with intellectual and developmental disabilities to become empowered, active members of their community. Those involved with the Beach Club were honored to have the Club selected from among hundreds of programs across the nation to present at the convention. The Club creates opportunities for its members to make an enormous impact in their community, whether volunteering in disaster relief efforts or participating in other community programs throughout the Outer Banks. At the convention, the Beach Club's creator and two of its members would be able to share the positive effects of the Club with people from all over the US.

# Attending the conference was a life-changing event for both Billy and Charlene.

Making the trip to Denver not only took Billy and Charlene far beyond their comfort zones, but they were able to inspire many people at the convention as well. Facing a standing-room-only crowd, they each expressed their passion and appreciation for the Monarch Beach Club, Charlene shared

her story through song and dance. Her graceful moves and beautiful voice painted a picture for the audience of how much more full her life has been since she came to the Club. Charlene was shy and withdrawn when she first arrived at the Club, barely able to maintain eye contact with others. But through Charlene's involvement in the community, the Club has allowed her to open up and meet new friends, expanding her social network.



Meanwhile, Renate Macchirole and Dr. Peggy Terhune, Monarch CEO, passed out ribbons to the audience—one ribbon with the word "irrelevant" and the other with "enlightened."

Macchirole and Terhune described to the audience the valuable community-based program and its "whole person" approach.

After the presentation, when the two were finished fielding questions, Dr. Terhune was glad to observe that people were showing off their ribbons to each other, announcing that they had been "enlightened." In fact, after the presentation, one attendee, inspired by the promise and impact of the Beach Club program, approached the presenters with tears in her eyes and said, "You have given me hope...I knew there was more we could be doing but up until now, I didn't know what it was."

The Monarch Beach Club is not only a nationally recognized program of distinction. It is a program that embraces the critical concept that disabilities are irrelevant and that every individual has strengths and gifts waiting to be discovered and shared. The Beach Club has already begun to spin off similar programs around eastern NC. Monarch envisions growing the successful program statewide.

He happily designated the sum to Monarch, an organization he says means the world to him and his daughter alike.
